Mr. DECONCINI, from the Select Committee on Intelligence, reported the following original bill; which was read twice and referred to the Committee on Armed Services for the thirty-day period provided in section 3(b) of Senate Resolution 400, Ninety-fourth Congress, except that if such Committee fails to report such bill within the thirty-day limit, such Committee shall be automatically discharged from further consideration of such bill in accordance with that section

A BILL

To authorize appropriations for fiscal year 1994 for intelligence activities of the United States Government and the Central Intelligence Agency Retirement and Disability System, and for other purposes.

1 *Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representa-*
2 *tives of the United States of America in Congress assembled,*

3 **SECTION 1. SHORT TITLE; TABLE OF CONTENTS.**

4 (a) **SHORT TITLE.**—This Act may be cited as the
5 “Intelligence Authorization Act for Fiscal Year 1994”.

3 **TITLE I—INTELLIGENCE** 4 **ACTIVITIES**

5 **SEC. 101. AUTHORIZATION OF APPROPRIATIONS.**

6 Funds are hereby authorized to be appropriated for
 7 fiscal year 1994 for the conduct of the intelligence activi-
 8 ties of the following elements of the United States Govern-
 9 ment:

10 (1) The Central Intelligence Agency.

1 (2) The Department of Defense.

2 (3) The Defense Intelligence Agency.

3 (4) The National Security Agency.

4 (5) The National Reconnaissance Office.

5 (6) The Central Imagery Office.

6 (7) The Department of the Army, the Depart-
7 ment of the Navy, and the Department of the Air
8 Force.

9 (8) The Department of State.

10 (9) The Department of the Treasury.

11 (10) The Department of Energy.

12 (11) The Federal Bureau of Investigation.

13 **SEC. 102. CLASSIFIED SCHEDULE OF AUTHORIZATIONS.**

14 (a) SPECIFICATIONS OF AMOUNTS AND PERSONNEL
15 CEILINGS.—The amounts authorized to be appropriated
16 under section 101, and the authorized personnel ceilings
17 as of September 30, 1994, for the conduct of the intel-
18 ligence activities of the elements listed in such section, are
19 those specified in the classified Schedule of Authorizations
20 prepared by the Select Committee on Intelligence of the
21 Senate to accompany (S. 1301) of the One Hundred Third
22 Congress.

23 (b) AVAILABILITY OF CLASSIFIED SCHEDULE OF AU-
24 THORIZATIONS.—The Schedule of Authorizations shall be
25 made available to the Committee on Appropriations of the

1 Senate and the Committee on Appropriations of the House
2 of Representatives and to the President. The President
3 shall provide for suitable distribution of the Schedule, or
4 of appropriate portions of the Schedule, within the execu-
5 tive branch.

6 **SEC. 103. PERSONNEL CEILING ADJUSTMENTS.**

7 (a) **AUTHORITY FOR ADJUSTMENTS.**—The Director
8 of Central Intelligence may authorize employment of civil-
9 ian personnel in excess of the number authorized for fiscal
10 year 1994 under section 102 of this Act whenever the Di-
11 rector determines that such action is necessary for the per-
12 formance of important intelligence functions, except that
13 such number may not, for any element of the intelligence
14 community, exceed 2 percent of the number of civilian per-
15 sonnel authorized under such section for such element.

16 (b) **NOTICE TO INTELLIGENCE COMMITTEES.**—The
17 Director of Central Intelligence shall promptly notify the
18 Permanent Select Committee on Intelligence of the House
19 of Representatives and the Select Committee on Intel-
20 ligence of the Senate whenever the Director exercises the
21 authority granted by this section.

22 **SEC. 104. COMMUNITY MANAGEMENT ACCOUNT.**

23 (a) **AUTHORIZATIONS OF APPROPRIATIONS.**—There
24 is authorized to be appropriated for the Community Man-
25 agement Account of the Director of Central Intelligence

1 for fiscal year 1994 the sum of \$144,588,000. Within such
2 amounts authorized, amounts identified for the Advanced
3 Research and Development Committee shall remain avail-
4 able for obligation through September 30, 1995.

5 (b) AUTHORIZED PERSONNEL LEVELS.—The Com-
6 munity Management Account of the Director of Central
7 Intelligence is authorized 237 full-time personnel as of
8 September 30, 1994. Such personnel of the Community
9 Management Account may be permanent employees of the
10 Community Management Account or personnel detailed
11 from other elements of the United States Government.

12 (c) REIMBURSEMENT.—During fiscal year 1994, any
13 officer or employee of the United States or a member of
14 the Armed Forces who is detailed to the Community Man-
15 agement Account from another element of the United
16 States Government shall be detailed on a reimbursable
17 basis, except that any such officer, employee, or member
18 may be detailed on a nonreimbursable basis for a period
19 of less than 1 year for the performance of temporary func-
20 tions as required by the Director of Central Intelligence.

1 **TITLE II—CENTRAL INTEL-**
 2 **LIGENCE AGENCY RETIRE-**
 3 **MENT AND DISABILITY SYS-**
 4 **TEM**

5 **SEC. 201. AUTHORIZATION OF APPROPRIATIONS.**

6 There is authorized to be appropriated for the
 7 Central Intelligence Agency Retirement and Disability
 8 Fund for fiscal year 1994 the sum of \$182,300,000.

9 **SEC. 202. TECHNICAL CORRECTIONS.**

10 (a) CORRECTIONS.—The Central Intelligence Agency
 11 Retirement Act (50 U.S.C. 2001 et seq.) is amended as
 12 follows:

13 (1) In section 101(7)—

14 (A) strike out the comma after “basic pay”
 15 and insert in lieu thereof “and”; and

16 (B) strike out “, and interest determined
 17 under section 281”.

18 (2) In section 201(c), strike out “proviso of sec-
 19 tion 102(d)(3) of the National Security Act of 1947,
 20 (50 U.S.C. 403(d)(3))” and insert in lieu thereof
 21 “requirement in section 103(c)(5) of the National
 22 Security Act of 1947 (50 U.S.C. 403–3(c)(5))”.

23 (3) In section 211(c)(2)(B), strike out “the re-
 24 quirement under section 241(b)(4)” and insert in
 25 lieu thereof “prior notification of a current spouse,

1 if any, unless notification is waived under cir-
2 cumstances described in section 221(b)(1)(D)”;

3 (4) In section 221—

4 (A) in subsection (a)(4), strike out “(or, in
5 the case of an annuity computed under section
6 232 and based on less than 3 years, over the
7 total service)”;

8 (B) in subsection (f)(1)(A)—

9 (i) insert “after the participant’s
10 death” before the period at the end of the
11 first sentence; and

12 (ii) strike out “after the participant’s
13 death” in the second sentence;

14 (C) in subsection (g)(1), strike out “(or is
15 remarried” and insert in lieu thereof “(or is re-
16 married,”; and

17 (D) In subsection (j), strike out “(except
18 as provided in paragraph (2))”.

19 (5) In section 222—

20 (A) in subsection (a)(7), strike out “any
21 other annuity” the first time it appears and in-
22 sert in lieu thereof “any survivor annuity”;

23 (B) in subsection (c)(3)(C), insert “the
24 participant” before “or does not qualify”; and

1 (C) in subsection (c)(4), strike out “ shall
 2 terminate” and all that follows and insert in
 3 lieu thereof “in the case of a spouse, shall ter-
 4minate on the last day of the month before the
 5 spouse dies, and, in the case of a former
 6 spouse, shall terminate on the last day of the
 7 month before the former spouse dies, or on the
 8 last day of the month before the former spouse
 9 remarries before attaining age 55”.

10 (6) In section 224(c)(1)(B)(i), strike out
 11 “former participant” and insert in lieu thereof “re-
 12 tired participant”.

13 (7) In section 225(c)—

14 (A) in paragraph (3), strike out “any other
 15 annuity” the first time it appears and insert in
 16 lieu thereof “any survivor annuity”; and

17 (B) in paragraph (4)(A), strike out
 18 “1991” and insert in lieu thereof “1990”.

19 (8) In section 231(d)(2), strike out “241(b)”
 20 and insert in lieu thereof “241(a)”.

21 (9) In section 232(b)(4), strike out “section
 22 222” and insert in lieu thereof “section 224”.

23 (10) In section 234(b), strike out “sections 241
 24 and 281” and insert in lieu thereof “section 241”.

25 (11) In section 241—

1 (A) in subsection (c), strike out “A lump-
 2 sum benefit that would have been payable to a
 3 participant, former participant, or annuitant, or
 4 to a survivor annuitant, authorized by sub-
 5 section (d) or (e) of this section or by section
 6 234(b) or 281(d)” and insert in lieu thereof “A
 7 lump-sum payment authorized by subsection (d)
 8 or (e) of this section or by section 281(d) and
 9 a payment of accrued and unpaid annuity au-
 10 thorized by subsection (f) of this section”;

11 (B) redesignate subsection (f) as sub-
 12 section (g); and

13 (C) insert after subsection (e) the following
 14 new subsection (f):

15 “(f) PAYMENT OF ACCRUED AND UNPAID ANNUITY
 16 WHEN RETIRED PARTICIPANT DIES.—If a retired partici-
 17 pant dies, any annuity accrued and unpaid shall be paid
 18 in accordance with subsection (c).”.

19 (12) In section 264(b)—

20 (A) in paragraph (2), insert “and” after
 21 the semicolon at the end;

22 (B) in paragraph (3), strike out “and to
 23 any payment of a return of contributions under
 24 section 234(a); and” and insert in lieu thereof
 25 “, and the amount of any such payment;”; and

1 (C) strike out paragraph (4).

2 (13) In section 265, strike out “Act” each place
3 it appears and insert in lieu thereof “title”.

4 (14) In section 291(b)(2), strike out “or section
5 232(c)”.

6 (15) In section 304(i)(1), strike out “section
7 102(a)(3)” and insert in lieu thereof “section
8 102(a)(4)”.

9 (b) RETROACTIVE EFFECTIVE DATE.—The amend-
10 ments made by subsection (a) shall be effective as of Feb-
11 ruary 1, 1993.

12 **TITLE III—GENERAL** 13 **PROVISIONS**

14 **SEC. 301. INCREASE IN EMPLOYEE COMPENSATION AND** 15 **BENEFITS AUTHORIZED BY LAW.**

16 There are authorized to be appropriated to carry out
17 the purposes of this Act such additional amounts for fiscal
18 year 1994 as may be necessary for increases in salary,
19 pay, retirement, and other employee benefits authorized
20 by law.

21 **SEC. 302. RESTRICTION ON CONDUCT OF INTELLIGENCE** 22 **ACTIVITIES.**

23 The authorization of appropriations in this Act does
24 not constitute authority for the conduct of any intelligence

1 activity which is not otherwise authorized by the Constitu-
2 tion or the laws of the United States.

3 **TITLE IV—CENTRAL**
4 **INTELLIGENCE AGENCY**

5 **SEC. 401. GENERAL COUNSEL OF THE CENTRAL INTEL-**
6 **LIGENCE AGENCY.**

7 (a) POSITION ESTABLISHED.—The Central Intel-
8 ligence Agency Act of 1949 (50 U.S.C. 403a et seq.) is
9 amended by adding at the end the following:

10 “GENERAL COUNSEL OF THE CENTRAL INTELLIGENCE
11 AGENCY

12 “SEC. 20. (a) There is a General Counsel of the
13 Central Intelligence Agency appointed from civilian life by
14 the President, by and with the advice and consent of the
15 Senate.

16 “(b) The General Counsel of the Central Intelligence
17 Agency is the chief legal officer of the Central Intelligence
18 Agency.

19 “(c) The General Counsel of the Central Intelligence
20 Agency shall perform such functions as the Director of
21 Central Intelligence may prescribe.”.

22 (b) PAY FOR POSITION.—Section 5315 of title 5,
23 United States Code, is amended by adding at the end the
24 following:

25 “General Counsel of the Central Intelligence
26 Agency.”.

1 (c) EFFECTIVE DATE.—The amendments made by
2 this section shall take effect one year after the date of
3 the enactment of this Act.

4 **SEC. 402. TECHNICAL AMENDMENTS TO THE CIA ACT AND**
5 **NATIONAL SECURITY ACT.**

6 (a) AMENDMENTS TO CIA ACT.—The Central Intel-
7 ligence Agency Act of 1949 (50 U.S.C. 403a et seq.) is
8 amended as follows:

9 (1) In section 5(a)—

10 (A) strike out “Bureau of the Budget” and
11 insert “Office of Management and Budget”;
12 and

13 (B) strike out “sections 102 and 303” and
14 insert in lieu thereof “subparagraphs (B) and
15 (C) of section 102(a)(2), subsections (c)(5) and
16 (d) of section 103, subsections (a) and (g) of
17 section 104, and section 303”.

18 (2) In section 6, strike out “section 102(d)(3)”
19 and insert in lieu thereof “section 103(c)(5)”.

20 (3) In section 19(b)—

21 (A) strike out “231” in the subsection
22 heading and in the matter after clause (iv) and
23 insert in lieu thereof “232”; and

24 (B) strike out “(50 U.S.C. 403 note)”.

1 (b) AMENDMENTS TO NATIONAL SECURITY ACT.—
2 Section 103(d)(3) of the National Security Act of 1947
3 is amended by striking out “providing” and inserting in
4 lieu thereof “provide”.

5 **TITLE V—DEPARTMENT OF**
6 **DEFENSE**

7 **SEC. 501. FOREIGN LANGUAGE PROFICIENCY PAY FOR**
8 **MEMBERS OF THE RESERVE COMPONENTS**
9 **OF THE ARMED FORCES.**

10 (a) BONUS AUTHORIZED.—Section 316(c) of title 37,
11 United States Code, is amended by striking out para-
12 graphs (1) and (2) and inserting in lieu thereof the follow-
13 ing:

14 “(1) Under regulations prescribed by the Secretary
15 concerned, when a member of a reserve component who
16 is entitled to compensation under section 206 of this title
17 meets the requirements for special pay authorized in sub-
18 section (a), except the requirement prescribed in sub-
19 section (a)(1), the member may be paid an annual foreign
20 language maintenance bonus.

21 “(2) The amount of the bonus under paragraph (1)
22 shall be determined by the Secretary concerned but may
23 not exceed the annual equivalent of the maximum monthly
24 rate of special pay authorized under subsection (b) for a
25 member referred to in subsection (a).”.

1 (b) EFFECTIVE DATE.—The amendment made by
2 subsection (a) shall take effect with respect to the first
3 month that begins more than 90 days after the date of
4 the enactment of this Act.

5 **SEC. 502. NATIONAL SECURITY EDUCATION TRUST FUND.**

6 (a) CREDITING OF GIFTS TO THE NATIONAL SECU-
7 RITY EDUCATION TRUST FUND.—Section 804(e) of the
8 Intelligence Authorization Act, Fiscal Year 1992 (50
9 U.S.C. 1904(e)) is amended by adding at the end thereof
10 the following:

11 “(3) Any gifts of money shall be credited to and form
12 a part of the Fund.”.

13 (b) REPEAL OF AUTHORIZATION REQUIREMENT.—
14 Section 804(b) of such Act is amended—

15 (1) by striking “(1)”;

16 (2) by redesignating subparagraphs (A) and
17 (B) as paragraphs (1) and (2); and

18 (3) by striking paragraph (2).

19 (c) TRANSFER OF FUNDS REQUIREMENT.—The Sec-
20 retary of Defense shall transfer \$25,000,000 from the Na-
21 tional Security Education Trust Fund to the miscellane-
22 ous receipts account of the Treasury.

1 **TITLE VI—FEDERAL BUREAU OF**
2 **INVESTIGATION**

3 **SEC. 601. FEDERAL BUREAU OF INVESTIGATION COUNTER-**
4 **INTELLIGENCE ACCESS TO CONSUMER CRED-**
5 **IT RECORDS.**

6 Section 608 of the Fair Credit Reporting Act (15
7 U.S.C. 1681f) is amended—

8 (1) by striking “Notwithstanding” and insert-
9 ing “(a) DISCLOSURE OF CERTAIN IDENTIFYING IN-
10 FORMATION.—Notwithstanding”; and

11 (2) by adding at the end the following new sub-
12 section:

13 “(b) DISCLOSURES TO THE FBI FOR COUNTER-
14 INTELLIGENCE PURPOSES.—

15 “(1) CONSUMER REPORTS.—Notwithstanding
16 the provisions of section 604, a consumer reporting
17 agency shall furnish a consumer report to the Fed-
18 eral Bureau of Investigation when presented with a
19 written request for a consumer report, signed by the
20 Director of the Federal Bureau of Investigation
21 (hereafter in this section referred to as the ‘Direc-
22 tor’) or the Director’s designee, which certifies com-
23 pliance with this subsection. The Director or the Di-
24 rector’s designee may make such a certification only

1 if the Director or the Director's designee has deter-
2 mined in writing that—

3 “(A) such records are necessary for the
4 conduct of an authorized foreign counterintel-
5 ligence investigation; and

6 “(B) there are specific and articulable
7 facts giving reason to believe that the consumer
8 whose consumer report is sought is a foreign
9 power or an agent of a foreign power, as de-
10 fined in section 101 of the Foreign Intelligence
11 Surveillance Act of 1978.

12 “(2) IDENTIFYING INFORMATION.—Notwith-
13 standing the provisions of section 604, a consumer
14 reporting agency shall furnish identifying informa-
15 tion respecting a consumer, limited to name, ad-
16 dress, former addresses, places of employment, or
17 former places of employment, to the Federal Bureau
18 of Investigation when presented with a written re-
19 quest, signed by the Director or the Director's des-
20 ignee, which certifies compliance with this sub-
21 section. The Director or the Director's designee may
22 make such a certification only if the Director or the
23 Director's designee has determined in writing that—

1 “(A) such information is necessary to the
2 conduct of an authorized foreign counterintel-
3 ligence investigation; and

4 “(B) there is information giving reason to
5 believe that the consumer has been, or is about
6 to be, in contact with a foreign power or an
7 agent of a foreign power, as defined in section
8 101 of the Foreign Intelligence Surveillance Act
9 of 1978.

10 “(3) CONFIDENTIALITY.—No consumer report-
11 ing agency or officer, employee, or agent of such
12 consumer reporting agency may disclose to any per-
13 son, other than those officers, employees or agents
14 of such agency necessary to fulfill the requirement
15 to disclose information to the Federal Bureau of In-
16 vestigation under this subsection, that the Federal
17 Bureau of Investigation has sought or obtained a
18 consumer report or identifying information respect-
19 ing any consumer under paragraph (1) or (2), nor
20 shall such agency, officer, employee, or agent include
21 in any consumer report any information that would
22 indicate that the Federal Bureau of Investigation
23 has sought or obtained such a consumer report or
24 identifying information.

1 “(4) PAYMENT OF FEES.—The Federal Bureau
2 of Investigation shall, subject to the availability of
3 appropriations, pay to the consumer reporting agen-
4 cy assembling or providing credit reports or identify-
5 ing information in accordance with procedures estab-
6 lished under this title, a fee for reimbursement for
7 such costs as are reasonably necessary and which
8 have been directly incurred in searching for, repro-
9 ducing, or transporting books, papers, records, or
10 other data required or requested to be produced
11 under this subsection.

12 “(5) LIMIT ON DISSEMINATION.—The Federal
13 Bureau of Investigation may not disseminate infor-
14 mation obtained pursuant to this subsection outside
15 of the Federal Bureau of Investigation, except to the
16 Department of Justice as may be necessary for the
17 approval or conduct of a foreign counterintelligence
18 investigation.

19 “(6) RULES OF CONSTRUCTION.—Nothing in
20 this subsection shall be construed to prohibit infor-
21 mation from being furnished by the Federal Bureau
22 of Investigation pursuant to a subpoena or court
23 order, or in connection with a judicial or administra-
24 tive proceeding to enforce the provisions of this Act.
25 Nothing in this subsection shall be construed to au-

1 thorize or permit the withholding of information
2 from the Congress.

3 “(7) REPORTS TO THE CONGRESS.—On a semi-
4 annual basis, the Attorney General of the United
5 States shall fully inform the Permanent Select Com-
6 mittee on Intelligence and the Committee on Bank-
7 ing, Finance and Urban Affairs of the House of
8 Representatives, and the Select Committee on Intel-
9 ligence and the Committee on Banking, Housing,
10 and Urban Affairs of the Senate concerning all re-
11 quests made pursuant to paragraph (1) and (2).

12 “(8) DAMAGES.—Any agency or department of
13 the United States obtaining or disclosing credit re-
14 ports, records, or information contained therein in
15 violation of this subsection is liable to the consumer
16 to whom such records relate in an amount equal to
17 the sum of—

18 “(A) \$100, without regard to the volume
19 of records involved;

20 “(B) any actual damages sustained by the
21 consumer as a result of the disclosure;

22 “(C) such punitive damages as a court
23 may allow, where the violation is found to have
24 been willful or intentional; and

1 “(D) in the case of any successful action to
2 enforce liability under this subsection, the costs
3 of the action, together with reasonable attor-
4 ney’s fees, as determined by the court.

5 “(9) DISCIPLINARY ACTIONS FOR VIOLA-
6 TIONS.—If a court determines that any agency or
7 department of the United States has violated any
8 provision of this subsection and the court finds that
9 the circumstances surrounding the violation raise
10 questions of whether or not an officer or employee
11 of the agency or department acted willfully or inten-
12 tionally with respect to the violation, the agency or
13 department shall promptly initiate a proceeding to
14 determine whether or not disciplinary action is war-
15 ranted against the officer or employee who was re-
16 sponsible for the violation.

17 “(10) GOOD-FAITH EXCEPTION.—Any credit re-
18 porting agency or agent or employee thereof making
19 a disclosure of credit reports or identifying informa-
20 tion pursuant to this subsection in good-faith reli-
21 ance upon a certificate by the Federal Bureau of In-
22 vestigation pursuant to provisions of this subsection
23 shall not be liable to any person for such disclosure
24 under this title, the constitution of any State, or any

1 law or regulation of any State or any political sub-
2 division of any State.

3 “(11) LIMITATION OF REMEDIES.—The rem-
4 edies and sanctions set forth in this subsection shall
5 be the only judicial remedies and sanctions for viola-
6 tions of this subsection.

7 “(12) INJUNCTIVE RELIEF.—In addition to any
8 other remedy contained in this subsection, injunctive
9 relief shall be available to require compliance with
10 the procedures of this subsection. In the event of
11 any successful action under this subsection, costs to-
12 gether with reasonable attorney’s fees, as determined
13 by the court, may be recovered.”.

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
