A BILL

To amend the Federal Advisory Committee Act to limit the application of that Act to meetings between Federal officers or employees and representatives of State, county, and local governments and Indian tribes, and to limit the application of that Act to activities of the Department of the Interior related to consultations of the Department with Indian tribal organizations with respect to the management of funds held in trust by the United States for Indian tribes.

- 1 *Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the United States of America in Congress assembled,*

1 **SECTION 1. LIMITATION ON APPLICATION OF FEDERAL AD-**2 **VISORY COMMITTEE ACT TO CERTAIN MEET-**3 **INGS AND CONSULTATIONS.**

4 Section 4 of the Federal Advisory Committee Act (5

5 U.S.C. App.) is amended—

6 (1) in subsection (c) by inserting before the pe-
7 riod the following: “, or to any meeting between a
8 full-time officer or employee of the Federal Govern-
9 ment and one or more representatives of any com-
10 bination of one or more State, county, or local gov-
11 ernments or Indian tribes”; and

12 (2) by adding at the end the following:

13 “(d) This Act does not apply to any activity of the
14 Department of the Interior related to consultation of the
15 Department with an Indian tribal organization with re-
16 spect to the management of funds held in trust by the
17 United States for an Indian tribe.”.
