Mr. DOMENICI (for himself, Mr. HAGEL, and Mr. BOND) introduced the following bill; which was read twice and referred jointly pursuant to the order of August 4, 1977, to the Committees on the Budget and Governmental Affairs, with instructions that if one committee reports, the other committee have thirty days to report or be discharged

A BILL

To provide new discretionary spending limits for fiscal year 2002, and for other purposes.

1 *Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representa-
2 tives of the United States of America in Congress assembled,*

3 SECTION 1. FY 2002 BUDGETARY PROVISIONS.

4 (a) DISCRETIONARY SPENDING LIMITS.—

5 (1) NEW DISCRETIONARY CAPS FOR 2002.—Sec-
6 tion 251(c)(6) of the Balanced Budget and Emer-
7 gency Deficit Control Act of 1985 (2 U.S.C. 901(c))
8 is amended by striking subparagraph (A) and insert-
9 ing the following:

1 “(A) for the discretionary category:
 2 \$681,441,000,000 in new budget authority and
 3 \$670,447,000,000 in outlays;”.

4 (2) NEW ALLOCATION TO THE APPROPRIATIONS
 5 COMMITTEES.—Notwithstanding the provisions of H.
 6 Con. Res. 83, as agreed to on May 10, 2001 (107th
 7 Congress) and the joint statement of managers ac-
 8 companying the conference report for the resolution,
 9 the budget authority and outlays for fiscal year
 10 2002 allocated under section 302 of the Congres-
 11 sional Budget Act of 1974 (2 U.S.C. 633) to the
 12 Committees on Appropriations shall be as follows:

13 (3) ENFORCEMENT OF BUDGET AGGRE-
 14 GATES.—Notwithstanding the provisions of H. Con.
 15 Res. 83, as agreed to on May 10, 2001 (107th Con-
 16 gress) and the joint statement of managers accom-
 17 panying the conference report for the resolution, for
 18 the purpose of enforcing the provisions of section
 19 311 of the Congressional Budget Act of 1974, the
 20 recommended levels and amounts set out in sections
 21 101(2) and 101(3) with respect to fiscal year 2002
 22 of that resolution shall be—

1 (A) \$1,653,193,000,000 in new budget au-
2 thority; and

3 (B) \$1,615,308,000,000 in outlays.

4 (4) ADJUSTMENTS FOR EMERGENCIES.—

5 (A) IN GENERAL.—Except as provided in
6 subparagraph (B), in making any adjustments
7 required by section 314(b)(1) of the Congress-
8 sional Budget Act of 1974 and in preparing the
9 report as required by section 254(f)(2) of the
10 Balanced Budget and Emergency Deficit Con-
11 trol Act of 1985 (2 U.S.C. 904(f)(2)) with re-
12 spect to fiscal year 2002, the adjustments re-
13 quired by section 251(b)(2)(A) of the Balanced
14 Budget and Emergency Deficit Control Act of
15 1985 shall not exceed \$2,200,000,000 in budget
16 authority and \$1,030,000,000 in outlays.

17 (B) EXCEPTION.—Subparagraph (A) shall
18 not apply with respect to legislation that is des-
19 ignated by the President and Congress as pro-
20 viding emergency funding in response to the
21 terrorist attacks of September 11, 2001.

22 (b) TREATMENT OF PAY-GO SPENDING.—In pre-
23 paring the final sequestration report required by section
24 254(f)(3) of the Balanced Budget and Emergency Deficit
25 Control Act of 1985 for fiscal year 2002, in addition to

1 the information required by that section, the Director of
2 the Office of Management and Budget shall change any
3 balance of direct spending and receipts legislation for fis-
4 cal year 2002 under section 253 of that Act so as to elimi-
5 nate any balances resulting from legislation enacted prior
6 to the date of enactment of this Act. All legislation enacted
7 subsequently shall be recorded in accordance with section
8 253 of that Act.

9 (c) REPEAL.—Section 203 of H. Con. Res. 83, agreed
10 to May 10, 2001 (107th Congress) is repealed.
