AN ACT

To extend the deadline for Social Services Block Grant expenditures of supplemental funds appropriated following disasters occurring in 2008.

1 *Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representa-*
2 *tives of the United States of America in Congress assembled,*

1 **SECTION 1. EXTENSION OF EXPENDITURE DEADLINE OF**
2 **SOCIAL SERVICES BLOCK GRANT DISASTER**
3 **FUNDING.**

4 Notwithstanding any other provision of law, amounts
5 made available to the Department of Health and Human
6 Services, Administration for Children and Families, under
7 the heading “Social Services Block Grant” under chapter
8 7 of division B of Public Law 110–329, shall remain avail-
9 able for expenditure through September 30, 2011.

10 **SEC. 2. BUDGETARY PROVISIONS.**

11 (a) **STATUTORY PAYGO.**—The budgetary effects of
12 this Act, for the purpose of complying with the Statutory
13 Pay-As-You-Go Act of 2010, shall be determined by ref-
14 erence to the latest statement titled “Budgetary Effects
15 of PAYGO Legislation” for this Act, submitted for print-
16 ing in the Congressional Record by the Chairman of the
17 Senate Budget Committee, provided that such statement
18 has been submitted prior to the vote on passage.

19 (b) **EMERGENCY DESIGNATIONS.**—This Act—

20 (1) is designated as an emergency requirement
21 pursuant to section 4(g) of the Statutory Pay-As-
22 You-Go Act of 2010 (Public Law 111–139; 2 U.S.C.
23 933(g));

24 (2) in the House of Representatives, is des-
25 ignated as an emergency for purposes of pay-as-you-
26 go principles; and

1 (3) in the Senate, is designated as an emer-
2 gency requirement and necessary to meet emergency
3 needs pursuant to section 403(a) of S. Con. Res. 13
4 (111th Congress), the concurrent resolution on the
5 budget for fiscal year 2010.
